The Location Of Sussex.




North of east and west Sussex borders Surrey and Kent.

Headlands

Sussex contains many headlands but Beachy Head and the Seven Sisters are our most popular and most visited headlands. Seven Sisters has seven peaks and Beachy Head bays too.

So what is a headland?

A headland is a piece of land that borders the sea. They are usually cliffs of high lumps of old rock. Beachy Head is made from chalk which is soft rock. So is the Seven Sisters.

Bays

Sussex also inherits many bays. Some more popular and more visited than others. Pevensey Bay is a popular and historical bay. Beachy Head also has a bay at the bottom. Some stony but when the tide goes out you can find some sand.

What is a bay?

A bay is where there is inland where there is a either sand or stones on a ow surface connecting to the sea.

Here is a famous headland and a famous river.

If you are to visit Beachy Head you will come across large white cliffs by the sea. The view form up there is stunning. But there are some dangers, so be careful!

Cuckmere Haven




The word 'Cuckmere' comes from the old English word "fast-flowing", since it descends over 100 miles!

Camber Sands is the most beautiful beach in Sussex! It is free and pretty. But be careful because you can get riptides.





The Cuckoo Cycle And Walkway Trail




The Cuckoo Trail runs from Hampden Park to Heathfield in East Sussex.






Drusillas park is a wonderful zoo with fun everywhere! They are child friendly too! They have some extraordinary animals that will take your mind away!


